
way to take a break from studying. Watch the newsletter for announcements.

Planning on working?

This year a record number of international students are looking for work. Please read the following information for authorization.

If you are planning on working this year, please remember that students who maintain J-1 or F- 1 visa status are allowed to work on campus for no more than 20 hours per week while school is in section. You can only work off-campus with a written approval from International Programs and the US Customs and Immigration Service.

If you have any questions, please send me an e-mail

ssprenger@pugetsound.edu and I'll prepare the necessary paperwork for on campus work authorization. I am also happy to arrange for a trip to the Social Security office to obtain your SSN which is the document required to work in the U.S.
