Differences between High School and Post-Secondary

Important Note

Students must be "otherwise qualified". Someone is considered to be "otherwise qualified" if, with or without reasonable accommodation, they meet the same standards -- academic, professional, technical, and behavioral standards -- as do others. It means meeting established criteria (e.g. admissions, course expectations, graduation, code of conduct).

Students are responsible for self-identification, providing documentation, and obtaining disability services. Deal directly with student (18+ yrs.old); protect student's right to privacy (FERPA). Provide access to any service, program, or activity sponsored by the institution. Provide accommodations in order to meet established standards/requirements. Provide reasonable accommodations based on documentation upon student request.	
INTENT	
Civil rights, non-discrimination Equal access 504/ADA ensure that no otherwise qualified person with a disability will be denied access to, the ben- efits of, or be subjected to discrimination by any program or activity provided by any public institu- tion or entity.	

All infants, children and youth requiring special education services until age 21 or graduation from high school are covered. A list of disabilities is provided in IDEA, and includes specific learning disabilities.

All qualified persons with disabilities who meet the entry criteria, or particular program criteria of the college and who can document the existence of a disability as defined by the ADA, are covered. **Disability** is defined as "Any physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities; having a record of such an impairment; or being regarded as having an impairment."
